

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



With temperatures in the 90's Aug. 2-3, the 63 POPS (Parachutist Over Phorty) competitors representing 18 states sweated through the supportions of the property of the states sweated through the competition along with members of the 82nd Airborne Division Sport Parachute Club who sponsored the meed for the second straight year.

Other Division units provided request to provide a support

vided medical support in case of emergencies and transportation from the manifest area to the aircraft boarding point. The Division's 82nd Signal Battalion and the 1st Squad-ron (Air), 17th Cavalry pro-vided helicopters for use as

the jump aircraft.

The POPS 75 Meet consisted of three events. Individual accuracy was first, followed by the "Hit and Rock" competition and the


three-man speed star.


The "Hit and Rock" jumpers has to land as close to the discas possible, remove his equipment, touch the disc and run to a nearby rocking chair and start rocking. Time starts for him as soon as he hits the ground and stops when he reaches the chair.

Descending from 3,000 feet to take first place in the individual accuracy competion was Mack Trent of Aberdeen. He missed the disc in his three jumps by only 0.07 cen-timeters. "Chuting" into second was Robert Farr of Second was Robert Fair of Fayetteville and third went to Bobby "Spider" Wrenn of the 82nd Sport Parachute Club with 0.36 and 0.79 centimeters

respectively.
The excited yells of "Hit the Disc, The Disc, Get It Off, Hurry, Hurry Up and Rock; could be heard all across the drop zone letting everyone know the "Hit and Rock" competition had started. Rocking his way into first place with a time of 6.1

seconds was Paul Katick of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania. A scant 1.3 seconds behind was George Zacher of Fayettev-ille, and Richard Phillips of Winterpark, floridarocked into third with 7.4 seconds.

The last event of the twoday meet was the three-man speed stars. Soaring into first place was the team of Len Zak, Gus Gutshall and George Zacher with atime of 16.4 seconds. The team of Donald Dupont, Harry Ervin and Patrick Moorehead earned second with 17.1 seconds. Thomas Hyde, Hans Kukk and Maximilian Miensopost flew their way into third with

19.4 seconds.

It was a rare occasion on Aug 3 when Sky Huminsky reached his 2,000th jump and Diamond Wings on the same jump lift that his wife, Donna, reached 1,000 jumps and her Gold Wings. Maj. Gen. Thomas H. Tackaberry, 82nd Airborne Division Commander, presented the husband and wife team from Lansing, Ill. with their Diamond and Gold Wings on the drop zone at an award ceremony held after the meet.

Both have been in National competition and both have jumped in night accuracy and night star events. Sky said, "To jump in a night star attempt takes confidence in everyone flying with you. Thats' what is so beautiful about his sport. I know jumpers from all over the world and wherever we go, the jumpers are the same, ready and willing to help out with anything, anytime."

Donna has started an organization called HOTS (Hags gamization called NOTS (hags Over Thirty) for the women jumpers. She said, "Most women who are over thirty don't want to admit, it, but I'm proud of my age. The organization started in March of this weer and only numbers of this year and only numbers 10 at this time, the amount of members will never get as big as POPS, but I think it will become very popular among women skydivers.

Two members of the 82nd Sport Parachute Club were honored when they received Certificates of Merit for their

sport Parachute Club were honored when they received Certificates of Merit for their recent performance in National competition. Nancy Wrenn was third in style and earned second overall in her competition. Mark Jones placed fifth in accuracy after

ten rounds of hard jumping.

Joe Sallas of Chicago presented Tackaberry with hand made knife and a 13-Star American Flag to fly over the Division area as part of the Army's 200th Birthday ob-

"Top Pop" Bob Rhyne of Flint, Michigan was back jumping agains this year and said, "All the old die hards keep coming back to the POPS Meet along with new people coming in every day, who are very strong, com-petitive jumpers, member-ship is world wide."

Requirements to be a POP are to be a member of the United States Parachute Association and be over 40 years


of age.
